

Benjamin Thorne's brother-in-law, Wm. Parsons settled first in this area and after Mr. Thorne arrived starter a mill and were the first to export wheat to England bringing back iron to Canada. The late Mr. A. O. Thorne moved to Thornhill from Langstaff in 1943 moving into one of the first two houses to be built in the Thornbank subdivision. This house now occupied by Mr. W. L. Burke was originally of frame construction and was situated on Yonge Street next to the Bank of Commerce.


