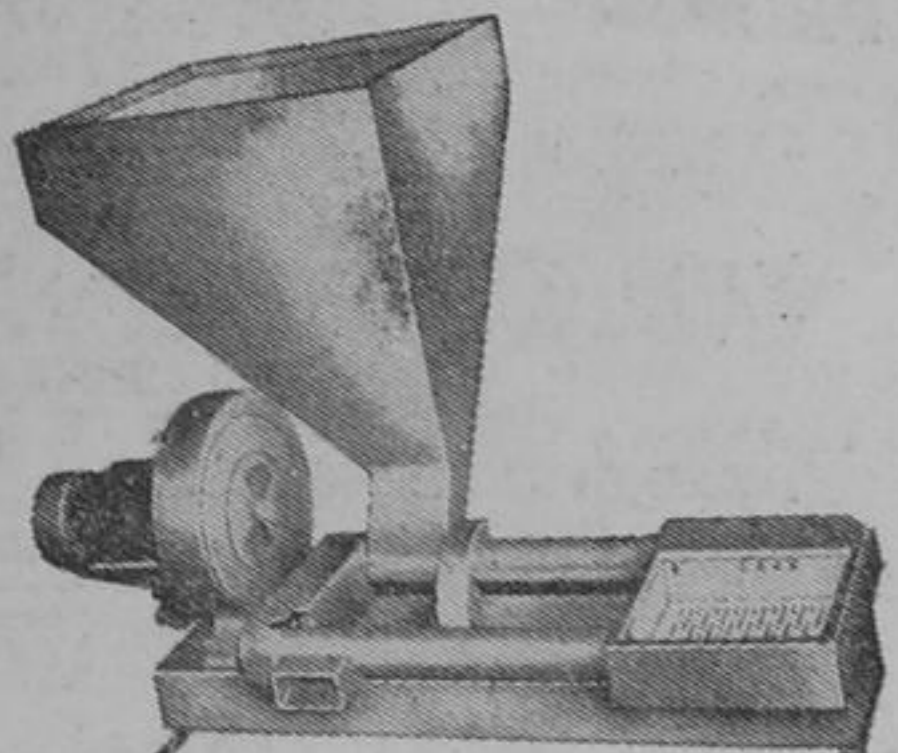

## Ted Hogan Does It Again - In Three Feature Race Victories

When Ted Hogan gets his blue and white No. 7 rolling there just seems to be no stopping him. This fact certainly must be evident to the 40 or so drivers who visit Pinecrest Speedway twice weekly in search of the cash which accompanies success in the stock car racing trade.

Last Saturday night, before more than 3,000 racing fans, Ted Hogan made it three feature race victories in succession as he carefully guided his jalopy over a damp track. George Conquer was second, Wild Bill Greathhead third.

The amazing thing about Hogan is that since arriving at Pinecrest early in June he has won six feature races. But even more unusual, his successes have come in

bunches of three, the first interrupted as Ben Lalomia of Buffalo raced to three in a row.

Saturday's meet was studded with accidents as the slippery track took a heavy toll. There was a spectacular gang crash on the first lap of the feature, necessitating a restart and earlier, Jim Hallehan was moved to hospital to get a split eye repaired after crashing a guard rail.

While everyone acknowledges that accidents are a part of the dangerous business of professional pedal-pushing, the No. 7 Highway track has experienced only one serious injury this season. And the victim of third-degree burns on that occasion, Doug Robinson, returned to action Saturday night after a month in hospital.
