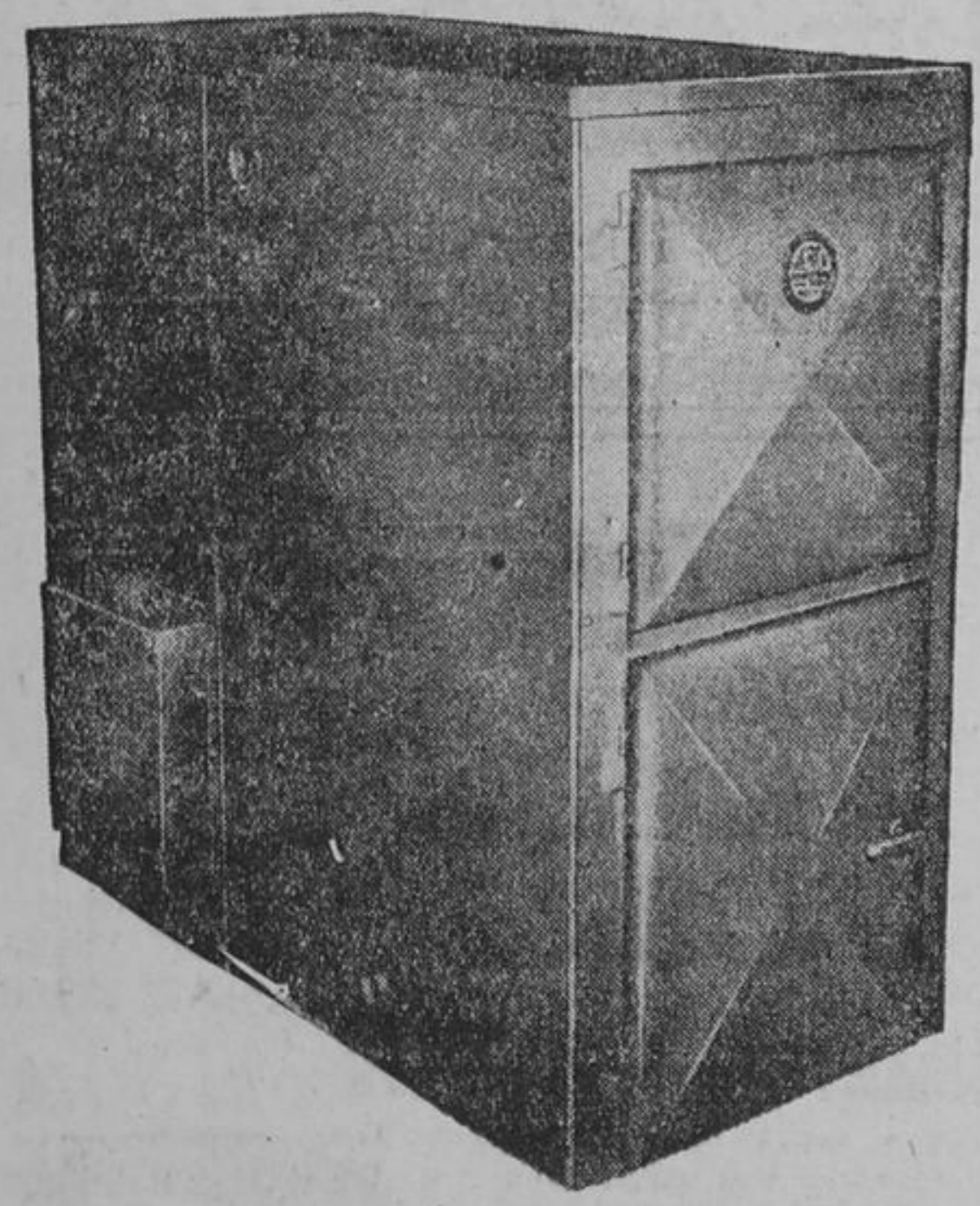


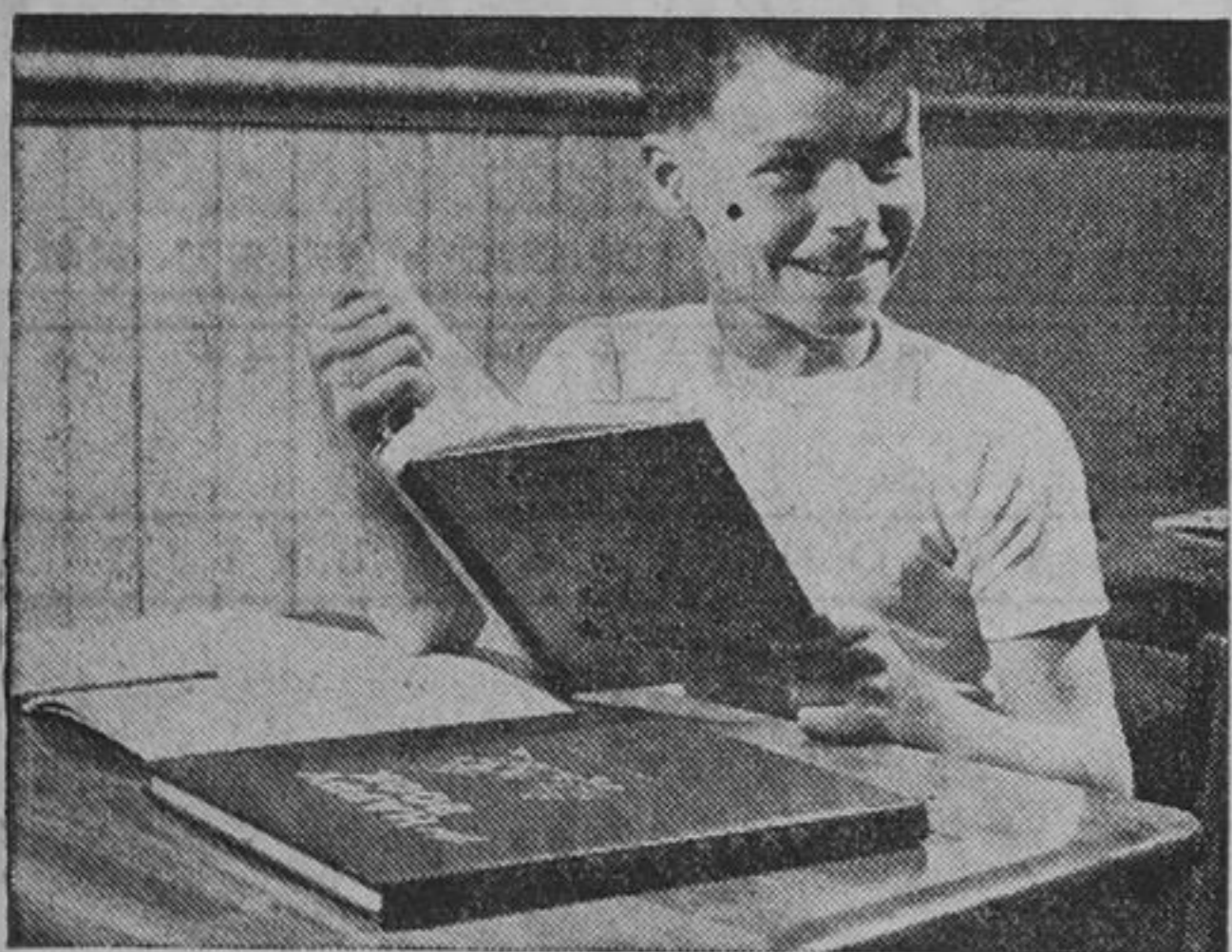

**Veterans' Insurance Act**  
 Section II of the Act has been repealed. This means that the face value of an Insurance Policy can be paid where under the Act the proceeds of the policy passes to the estate of the insured. Formerly only the net premium value with interest could be paid to an estate.
