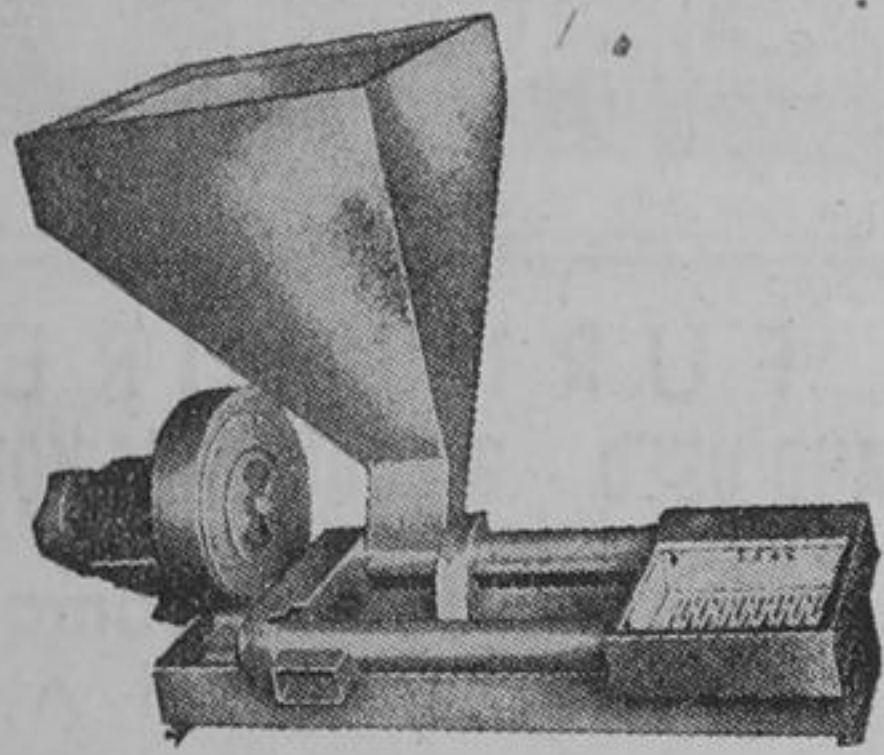

Mrs. Van den Hoek gave an excellent outline of what is taught in her class, some of the highlights being study of nutrition, good grooming, care of clothing, economy in stretching the food dollar as far as possible, care and value of their possessions, how to work in the home, child care, development of manners and deportment. When the girls' course is complete, they will be efficient managers in the home.

She hoped very soon that the ground work in home economics would be taught in all public schools. Nice surroundings at home and school helped the girls in their study. Mothers could also help their daughters by allowing them to bake and to use the sewing machine.

A good deal of the graciousness in our homes has been lost, probably by the change of times, and Mrs. Van den Hoek sincerely hopes that there will be a swing back to the art of gracious living in the home. She asked for the co-operation of the parents in school programs and also stressed that Canada nutrition rules should be taught and stressed in the schools constantly.
