This move was opposed by Councillor LeMasurier, "what incidentals is the \$1,880 to cover, incidentally anything?" On the request of Mr. LeMasurier a recorded vote was taken on the resolution authorizing the inclusion of this \$1,880 in the total cost of the offices. The motion carried with Messrs. Timbers, James, Hooper and Lennie voting in the affirmative while Mr. LeMasurier was opposed.

Thus this new total figure is made up of the general contractor's price of \$53,523 plus a total of \$11,597 for the amount of wiring and heating plus the \$1,880 to cover incidentals making a grand total of \$67,000.

The township solicitor J. D. Lucas armed with the new figure was instructed to approach the Municipal Board immediately and request the holding of a new Public Hearing.

Nominations, November 21st

Election Day In Markham Twp. Set For December 1st

At Monday's Markham township council meeting the members set the election day for this year as Monday, December 1. The polls will be open from 10 o'clock in the morning until 8 in the evening. Nominations will be held on Friday, November 21, beginning at 1 p.m. in the afternoon, in the Veterans' Hall, Unionville. A suggestion by Councillor A. LeMasurier that nominations be held in the evening instead of the afternoon failed to gain any support.

Mr. Alec Winter was appointed D.R.O. for Doncaster, and similarly Mr. James Butcher was appointed D.R.O. in Langstaff.

T.T.C. Fares

Reeve W. Timbers reported on a meeting called last Friday by the four municipalities concerned with the operation of the North Yonge Bus Line and the T. T. C. to consider the contentious issue of the present fare structure. Both North York township and Markham township have signified their desire to have the line revert back to the 1951 fare schedule and reduced services. While Vaughan township and the village of Richmond Hill have taken the opposite view and want the municipalities to stand pat on the new fares. North York township has already referred the matter to the Municipal Board for a ruling.

Councillor A. Lennie — "The services should be reduced. Councillor A. LeMasurier — "There are too many empty buses on the line." Reeve Timbers — "The ratepayers were too hasty in voicing their objections, they haven't given them a fair trial." Doncaster Ratepayers filed a letter with Council objecting to the new rates and requesting a return to the old system.

Fire Protection
The Fire Committee (LeMasurier and Lennie) have been authorized

to approach the Markham Village Fire Brigade and draw up a mutual aid agreement between the township and that brigade. Under the terms of the agreement Markham brigade will handle any calls in fire area covering the bottom south-east corner of the township. It is expected the township will offer Markham an arrangement similar to the one they now have with Stouffville, by which they are paid \$60 a fire with no annual retainer fee.

The Fire Committee was also delegated to make arrangements for the establishment of four fire areas throughout the township. Each area to be under the jurisdiction of either of the four fire brigades, namely, Richmond Hill, Unionville, Markham village and Stouffville.

An interesting sidelight of the fire report was the fact that over the past 3 years the township has paid the Richmond Hill Brigade an average yearly fee of \$843.00, the Stouffville Brigade an average yearly fee of \$353.00, the North York Brigade an average yearly fee of \$103.00, and the Scarborough Brigade an average yearly fee of \$102.00.

Unionville
The members voted a \$50.00 grant to the Unionville Junior Farmers. Next Monday afternoon the council make its annual inspection trip to the Unionville Community Centre.

Building Inspector

Thor C. Hansen To Address Evening W.A. United Church

Mr. Hansen, in his capacity of lecturer on folk art and Canadian crafts is sponsored by the British American Oil Company Limited. A B-A employee for 22 years, he is largely responsible for the Company's policy of encouraging the development of localized crafts movements with the object of stimulating cultural achievement in Canada and promoting the tourist industry.

Mrs. F. Southwell, president of the Evening Women's Association of the Richmond Hill United Church has announced that Mr. Hansen will address their association at 4½ Monday, November 3 meeting.

Mr. Hansen stresses the necessity of using creative imagination

in every walk of life. He has stressed how favorably its application could benefit the fields of mental health, cultural development and the Canadian economy.

The great denominator for all people, says Mr. Hansen, is the quest for happiness. Progress should be measured in terms of happiness. If some development, material or abstract, made people happier, it could justly be called progress. On the other hand, if it caused them to be less happy, such a development constituted regress.

In Ontario Thor Hansen's reputation in the designing field has become known and a number of his designs have been commissioned by educational and community groups and the Ontario government. Of particular note was his active participation in the Simcoe County Arts and Crafts Association which held the first Canadian rug and quilt fair at Midland in 1949. His designs were used extensively and he also lectured on subjects connected with the group's activities. Later some Hansen designs and completed work were exhibited in the Toronto Art Gallery.
