Historic Pictures
Newcomers to Fisherville, situated in the south-west corner of Concord school section, no doubt found it difficult to imagine what it must have been like years ago when there was an old mill on the Allan farm or when the church was newly built or when the old Cherry Hotel was a busy place. Difficult to imagine, that is, until they visited Timothy Eaton Memorial Church, Toronto on Sunday, November 16, and were shown pictures by Dr. Defries of all these places together with a picture of the first minister of Fisherville United Church, taken 96 years ago.

Great, indeed, must have been the contrast noted by these friends of the sleepy old mill nestled in sparsely settled countryside and the present day aerial photo of the modern research laboratory now occupying its place.
There is no trace left of the Cherry Hotel. It stood at the crossroad of Steele's Ave. and Dufferin St. and was a two-storey frame structure with entrance and porch facing Dufferin St. There were a number of bedrooms, a dining room and a bar. In those days there was a large livery stable to the south and east of the building where travellers from neighboring villages could stable their horses.
The old mill the hotel and old friends are gone now but the church lives on forever linking the present with the past.
