

Sanitation By-Law The pressing problem of adequate sanitation in Highland Park was up for discussion. In opening the debate Councillor Lennie referred to the Board of Health's recommendations, and his earlier resolution requesting that dwellings be used as one family units. Reeve Timbers felt such a by-law would be a step in the right direction ,if applied in the built-up areas. Deputy-Reeve LeMasurier - "I objected to the original resolution because it would have been applicable to the whole township. Councillor Hooper disagreed with any such proposed by-law stating, "If a septic tank is properly installed you won't have any sewage

problems. "Furthermore you can't stop people from renting rooms in their own homes," he added. Deputy-Reeve LeMasurier - "This problem should be attacked from a sanitary angle. Why attempt to arbitrarily tell people whose septic tank is working properly they must evict their roomers." Councillor Lennie - "It is our duty to implement the recommendations of our Health Unit."
