In a letter from the firm of Margison and Babcock, engineers, the Vaughan Township Council learned at its meeting on Monday that the proposed drainage project for the Ball Subdivision would cost in the vicinity of \$15,800. This project would be completed by September and the cost stretched over a 10 year period. The cost will possibly be divided between the Subdivision owner, the township and the property owners concerned. The drainage in this area has proven a difficulty for some time and has now reached serious proportions warranting immediate attention.
