**Back From Finland**  
Mrs. John Fisher returned recently from a four-months' trip to Finland where she was present at her father's birthday celebrations, in Pori. She was accompanied on her return by her cousin, Miss Liisa Myyra of Porvo, Finland, who is planning to make her home here.

Hand-carving has been highly developed there and among the souvenirs Mrs. Fisher brought back are a carved caribou and a moose with the hair carefully carved with knives that resemble our Scout knives. Then there is a Cross of David made of curls shaved from a single piece of wood and still attached to it, besides articles of bone, delicately etched with a hot needle to form designs, which are made into costume jewellery. Reindeer's horns have been used to make a candlestick holder on the broad base of which has been etched a bear in a woodland setting. This is work at which the Laplanders excel. Another piece of work which attracts the eye is a shore scene with all the details of foreground and background as well as the frame composed of a single piece of wood, contrasts in tone being achieved by staining.

**Easter**  
Special Easter slides will be shown at the Richvale Sunday School in the school at 3 p.m. and a welcome is extended to all children and their parents.

**Home and School**  
F. H. Shaw, Probation Officer of the York County Juvenile Court, spoke before an attentive audience at the Charles Howitt Home and School Association on Monday evening.

"The York County Juvenile Court and Family Court which are two-in-one under one judge, have been in existence for 22 years and while they have received little publicity are doing a sound job," Mr. Shaw said in his opening remarks.

He referred to the careful studies over the past 25 years by the well known authority on children's normal behaviour, Arnold Gessell, professor of Yale University. In tracing the social behaviour of children with problems the court has found something interferes with the seemingly satisfactory emotional and physical growth, which stems from broken homes, mental inadequacies and lack of affection.

As to why adoption procedures are so slow, Mr. Shaw said that the court has to be very sure of the reason for the adoption. "Adoption is not to save a marriage, not to give a child a safe home, but is just because the two parents love the child," Mr. Shaw stated.

In speaking of those mentally retarded Mr. Shaw said that the court's work was hampered by the parents' guilty feelings much as the medical men were formerly hampered in their efforts by those

who hesitated to admit that they had tuberculosis in the family, for instance. There is a need for protective workshops for these cases and with help at an early age they might be able to make a certain adjustment to certain controlled situations.

"Adolescents need a great deal of sympathetic understanding. This is a period when the child is experimenting with being an adult. Too rigid a parent will not allow the child enough leeway, and with too lax a parent the child doesn't receive the support he needs. Clothes, to an adolescent, as to an adult, establish his status in the group and are important to his feeling of adequacy among his contemporaries," Mr. Shaw explained.

To the question regarding the harmful effects of movies, comics, and television, Mr. Shaw suggested that children need to be won to an appreciation of the "good stuff" by a mild insistence by the parents, and the teachers, and then, he said, they learn to appreciate the deeper things.

"The experience of the court has shown that juvenile delinquency begins at seven years of age. Seek assistance early. Remember that if you wait until the child is 15 years of age, that he has taken 15 years to develop into this kind of child, and his behaviour and personality problems are pretty well set." In his concluding remarks Mr. Shaw said that in Quebec the names for these children were re-named "Protective Homes" to remove the stigma from the child.

There is no psychiatric centre for disturbed children in Ontario at present or no type of home where they can be placed under the right kind of controlled supervision. "We are hoping," Mr. Shaw said, "that there will be such a centre in the new hospital that is to be built in Toronto."
