

APRIL WINDS

April's wild winds are often the cause of cinders and foreign bodies blowing into the eyes. When this happens it is not advisable to rub the eye. Wipe the lower lid carefully, then, pulling out the upper lid by the ashes, bring it down over the lower lashes which may act as a brush to sweep away the cinder. If this does not work or if tears do not wash the object out, it is best to consult the nearest doc-

tor. It is never safe to allow an untrained person to tamper with the eye since probing or rubbing may cause the object to become embedded in the eye or scratch the eyeball, with ensuing pain and in-


