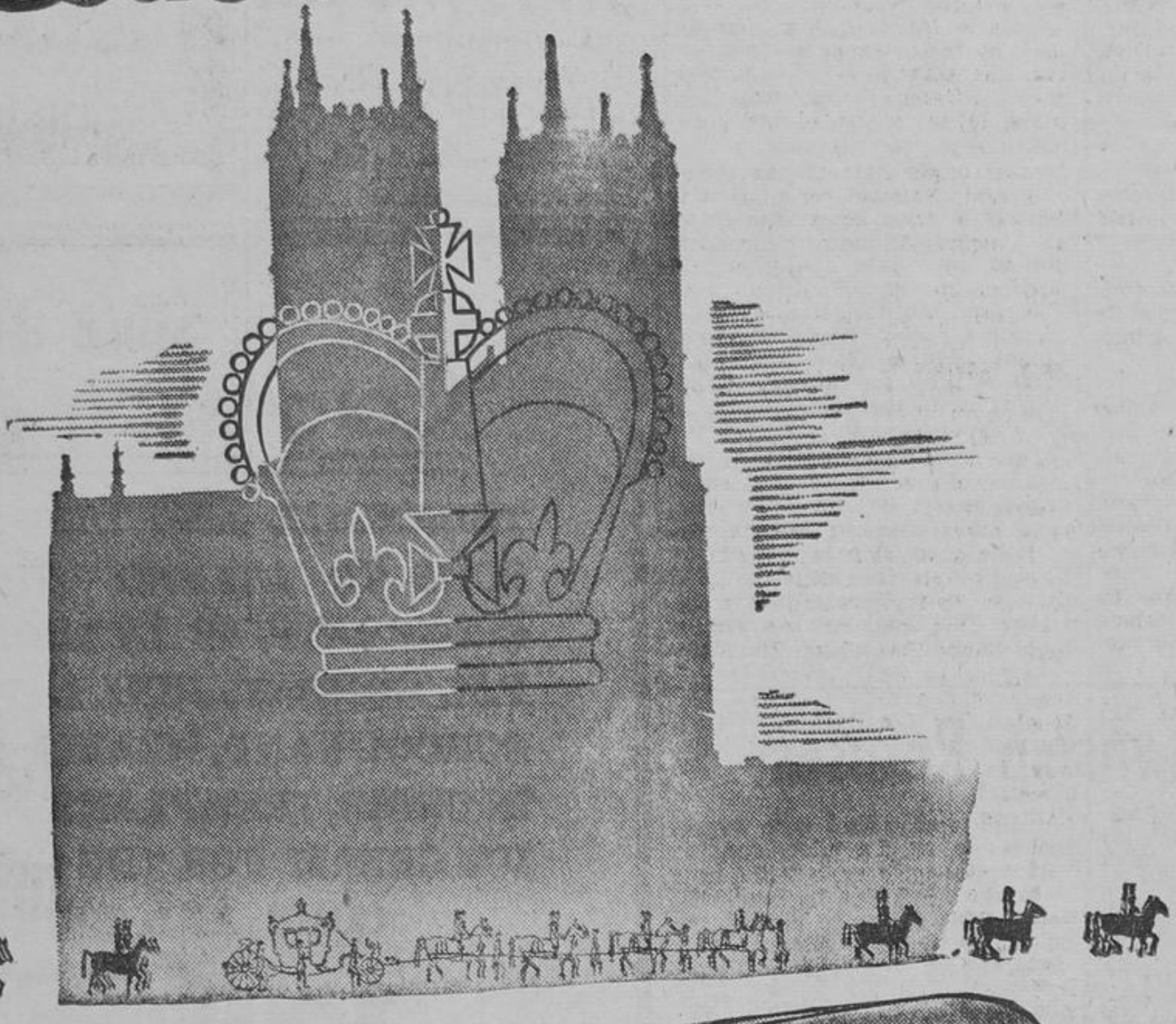

Richvale Chapel, as it is called, is located on the north side of Oak Avenue, half a block west of Yonge Street (Stop 22).

The Chapel which has been built to meet a long growing need throughout the area will have a seating capacity of well over 200.

The preaching and teaching will unquestionably be sound and scriptural with great emphasis on the Holy Scriptures. A sincere attempt will be made to follow New Testament principles of gathering and worship. Special speakers will be invited from time to time. Most of the conducting will be done by local help.

Services will be conducted at the following hours each Sunday, beginning June 7th: 9:45 a.m., Communion Service; 11:00 a.m., Family Worship; 3:00 p.m., Sunday School; 7:00 p.m., Evening Service.

\$871.00 has just been announced by Mr. E. G. Brown, District Supervisor, as results of the current financial campaign in Richmond Hill by The Canadian National Institute for the Blind. The drive was conducted by Mrs. Jack Smith and Mrs. J. Koning who have been working as volunteers with the Institute for several years. This year's total is the greatest on record, and will ensure a high standard of service to the blind of the district.

C.N.I.B. service is designed for the development of the whole person, locating employment for those who are suitable, assisting housewives to carry on their regular duties, and providing recreations to ease the burden of blindness. From the Pre-School child to the elderly and lonely, C.N.I.B. has a means of aiding the sightless to lead a better life.

The annual campaign pays for these services, and expands and develops still further methods of building the blind into better Canadians.
