The motor of the 1953 model car was left 50 yards from the crossing. Mrs. Clamp's body was found 200 feet south of the crossing. Her husband's body was 150 feet further along the right of

The car was found on its top two yards from the track. All the wheels had been ripped off. Over the steering wheel there was crumpled road map. Between the car and the crossing, at least quarter of a mile away, parts of the vehicle were scattered.

The cowcatcher of the locomotive was found in the grass several yards from the wreckage of the car. Police Chief Bone said he was "satisfied" there was not a third person in the death car. Dr. H. C. Moorehouse, superintendent of the Ontario hospital, said Clamp had been chief engineer there for five years. He began working with the hospital at Brockville in 1935 and became chief engineer there before moving to Cobourg.
