Annouce Winners In York County Winter Wheat Club.

Results of the York County 50 Bushel Winter Wheat Club just released by W. M. C. Cockburn, Secretary of the York County Soil and Crop Improvement Assoc. shows that veteran winner Chas. Casey of King, R.R. 3 is back in first place again with a yield of 69.6 bus. per acre and a total yield and field score of 227 points. He was followed by Wm. Latimer of Sutton with 67.2 bus. and a total score of 218.4, while Mrs. Levi Weddel of Sharon had 68 bus. and her total score was 218. Fourth place goes to Davidson Bros. of Agincourt with a total score of 216.6 points and Norman Payne of Maple stands fifth though he had the second highest yield with 68.8 bus.

This is the fourth win for Mr. Casey who has won every year since 1949 except last year and it is interesting to note his winnings were as follows: 1949, 68.3 bus.; 1950, 69.9 bus.; 1951, 66.8 bus.; and 1953, 69.6 bus. In spite of a drop to 57.8 last year, he has a five year average of 66.5 bus. per acre. This year, Mr. Casey as well as six others, grew the Daubul variety. All the others had Cornell.

In this contest, the fields are scored on the basis of 100 points for the standing crop, plus two points per bushel on the estimated yield. Cuttings are taken of a specified area in four representative places in the field and the grain is forwarded by the Agricultural Representative to the Ontario Agricultural College for threshing and computing of yields. The three highest contestants now forward a bushel to the Royal Winter Fair for inter-county competition where the samples will be tested for milling quality by the Maple Leaf Milling Company sponsors of the contest.

It is interesting to note that only one of the twenty competitors this year had under the 50 bushel mark and the target has been raised to 60 bushels for 1953-54.

Twp. Council Meeting Aurora Boosts Fees For Fighting King TWP. Fires

At a busy meeting of King Township Council on Monday afternoon at Nobleton a letter was read from Aurora submitting a proposal whereby the rates of payment for fire protection will be raised to a retainer fee of \$250 annually, plus a fee of \$60 for each fire attended for the first two hours, plus \$10 for each succeeding hour. If this proposal is agreeable to King Township, Aurora will later accept such an agreement. The extra cost of fire protection has been caused chiefly by the higher telephone costs since the dial system has been installed, with the result that one member of the Fire Dept. must be on call at his home for twenty-four hours each day. "We can't expect Aurora to take a loss on account of the new telephone system, which is giving us better service," said deputy reeve, William Hodgson. There is an average of twenty to twenty five calls on the Aurora Fire Department from King Township every year. The former charge was a retainer fee of \$250 plus \$50 for each fire. At this meeting \$100 was paid to the Aurora Fire Dept. for two fires, one in August in the Hummer Trails, and the other on the 3rd. con. of King this month.

Sums of money were authorized for local fairs, etc. For the King and Vaughan Plowing match, \$50; for the Schomberg Fair, \$125; and for the Albion and Bolton Agricultural Society, \$20.

A By-Law was read for the third time to allow the issuing of debentures for the improvement of the present school building at Oak Ridges, and for the building or an addition. The total debenture is \$101,000.00 issued at 5% interest over 20 years.

(Continued from page 1) "dump garbage at night then," rehomes can be erected in this area; the only exception being in the case of houses already built and of certain specified size. Building Inspector R. Norton reported that he had only issued a permit for a 1 family dwelling. "The original plan didn't show a kitchen on every floor," stated Mr. Norton. Council has instructed the Building Inspector to investigate the matter and take appropriate action if any by-law has been broken.

Other Business

Two by-laws were passed during the afternoon. Several important amendments were made to the building by-laws mainly concerning the amount of permit fees. The members also passed a \$250.00 licensing fee to be paid by the operator of any mobile soft drink or ice-cream stand operating within the township.

The Road Superintendent and Engineer have been delegated to investigate several sewage complaints from Highland Park residents.

October 28th has been set aside as the next session of the Court of Revision. Grants approved included \$300.00 to the Unionville Community Centre, and \$25.00 each to the North York and East York Ploughing Association.
