#### Kids Demand Realistic Motor Transport Toys



Toy makers report they cannot get by with faulty imitations of automobiles, trucks, tractors and trailers with the present generation of small fry. #### Metropolitan Area May Not Take Over North York Water

According to a letter from the Chief Engineer of the new Metropolitan area filed at Tuesday's Markham township council meeting the Metropolitan Council is not planning to take over the assets of the North York Water Works department and the limited township water area on January 1.

An earlier report compiled by the township's Plumbing and Sanitation Committee (Councilors A. Lennie and C. Hooper) indicated that the Metropolitan Council was intending to take over the assets of the North York Water Works department at the first of the new year. In its letter the Metropolitan Council stated the existing Markham township water agreement will still fall under the jurisdiction of North York township.

Reeve W. Timbers expressed surprise at the information remarking that, "one of the main reasons for setting up the Metropolitan area was to solve the various transportation and water problems in the Toronto area".

The letter in question was the result of Council's efforts to arrange as suggested by the Plumbing and Sanitation Committee an early meeting with the new Council in order to discuss Markham's water problem.

**High School Site**  
The Council will shortly arrange a meeting with the Richmond Hill District High School Board to discuss the matter of roads and water connected with the board's new school site in Thornhill. Council plans to have its Solicitor, Engineer and the chairman of the Planning Board attend this meeting.

**Road Budget**  
Road Committee Chairman, Councilor W. Clark informed the members of plans to meet soon with the Minister of Highways regarding a possible restoration of the \$25,000 cut made by the Department in this year's road budget. The whole Council will visit the Minister and at the same time it is planned to discuss the long overdue subsidy on the Thornhill sidewalks.

**Other Business**  
The members will purchase new furniture for the Buttonville offices until the staff is settled in its new quarters and requirements analysed.

The Council approved the following schedule of payments for election officers: Returning officers, \$30.00; Deputy Returning officers, \$10; Poll Clerks, \$8.00; Constables \$8.00; Double Polling Booth, \$12.00; Single Polling Booth, \$10.00.

In a fine spirit of sportsmanship Reeve Timbers congratulated the successful candidates in Monday's voting and also thanked the members of the 1953 Council for the support and co-operation they had given him during the year.
