

DON'T BANISH FRESH AIR

As soon ts the cool breezes blow, most houses have their winter mufflers of weatherstripping and storm windows applied to ensure that cold air does not penetrate, but this can become too much of a good thing. Since most homes are kept at a fairly high temperature, many of them without any humidifying agent, in-doors may not be the healthiest place. Drafts should be avoided of course, but fresh air and the necessary amount of moisture required by the human respiratory system are essential.
