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#### SECONDARY SCHOOL NOTES FROM RICHMOND HILL DIST. HIGH SCHOOL

The O.S.S.T.F. Regional Conference:— Important Preliminary to Education Wk.

Education Week focusses attention on the problems and achievements of education generally. From time to time, education comes under fire on the grounds that the present system is not providing enough guidance for living, that too often "instruction is confused with education." We doubt if more money for education is the whole answer to the problem: it is questionable if another hundred million dollars pumped into education in this province would raise by even one per cent the intellectual and moral level of our young people, partcularly of those from deficient homes. Perhaps continuous curriculum studies - in which the secondary school teachers of this province are earnestly and continually engaged - will provide the answer. Of one thing, however, we are certain: the interest that parents and the general public take in education will stimulate the efforts of both teachers and students to attain their highest goals.

The teachers of the Richmond Hill District High School attended on Thursday, February 25, a Regional Curriculum Conference at two schools: the Etobicoke Collegiate Institute and the George Harvey Technical School. This annual conference, conducted by the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation, is designed to cover every subject of the curriculum, and is an important feature of the in-service training programme of second' ary school teachers.

This year's conference was larger than any held previously. More than 800 high school teachers of the large district surrounding Toronto took part in an all-day meeting in one or both of the schools. In each of twenty odd sections ,forty to fifty teachers spent the day discussing courses, books, methods, examinations, and problems of the high-school student. Schedules of related subjects were so arranged that it was possible for a teacher to participate in discussions of the different subjects he taught. A large book display was set up in the gymnasium of Etobicoke Collegiate to acquaint teachers with new publications on the various subjects of the secondary school curriculum.

The high school courses, which are continuously being examined and revised are designed to give the student a fund of knowledge which will help him to earn a living, and what is more important, a training for living a full life. The recent Curriculum Conference held in this district marks another step in the realization of these aims.

Parents' Night At Richmond Hill District High School

Parents' Night at school is something akin to the first encounter between in-laws and the prospective son-in-law. At last the parents see in the flesh that personage which, for better or for worse, occupies a good deal of their child's attention. Like some in-laws, the parents may have their earlier suspicions confirmed, (What does she see in him?) Or perhaps, with stoic resignation, both parents and the in-laws may say, "What can you expect from her now?" Or perhaps with a sprightly, "Things are fine", parents go home somewhat more relieved about the immediate future of their child

On February 2 and 3, Richmond Hill District High School held its annual Parents' Night and the staff hopes that most parents could say at least, "Things are fine". This year for the first time two nights were given over to parent-teacher discussion. The parents of students in lower school came one evening and the parents of the more senior students the other.

Most teachers on the staff agreed afterwards that the project was of worthwhile value. Many misunderstandings were removed and many more discussed. Some parents supplied information which proved invaluable to the teacher's complete understanding of the pupil. One pupil, for instance, may have appeared listless, indifferent and lazy in class. He offered no good explanation for his attitude and only the parents' disclosure that he suffered from a heart condition prevented the teacher from drawing an unwarranted and unfair conclusion. Perhaps the above is an extreme example of what was accomplished by this free and frank discussion but it is an indication of the value of such Parents' Nghts. No matter what was discussed the teachers' impression of the parents broadens his understanding of the pupil. Many interviews resulted in a concrete policy of co-operation between teacher and parent.

All too often, however, many of the parents who came didn't really have to and many of those who should have, didn't appear. It is a pleasant task to tell parents that their boy or girl is succeeding well and is providing no problems. But all of the teachers would have liked to meet more of the parents of those students who are having trouble or are making it. Like the sonin-law, the teacher might say, "If the parents are not interested enough to meet me they will have to accept what I do in suffering

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

The York County Hospital, Newmarket, shown above is officially a 52 bed hospital, but it generally has as many as 80 patients. The Nursery built to accommodate 12 babies is usually over-crowded with as many as 20 babies or more being cared for at a time.
