Auditor N. L. Morton presented his report of the township's finances to Council and complimented the successful year of financing, especially mentioning the tax arrears. The 1953 tax arrears stand at \$54,000 but only \$970. worth of taxes more than a year old are outstanding. The debenture debt for '53 stood at \$279,018. while the operating surplus was \$267. He cautioned, however, that in times of rising costs, a township the size of Vaughan should have a bigger surplus than \$10,000.
