**New Gas Station**  
Hon. George Doucet cut the ribbon to open the new Shell Company Service Station on the Barrie Highway at the King interchange on Thursday, June 10, at 1 p.m. Around the station Union Jacks were flying to herald the opening. A buffet dinner was served to the 105 guests in the Bard 400 restaurant. Guests included Hon. George Doucet, Minister of Highways, Mr. Ash, President of Shell, Commissioner McNeil of the Provincial Police, Inspector Hand from Newmarket, Mr. J. B. Parkin, Reeve Elton Armstrong, Mr. Burnett, regional general manager of Shell, Mr. Drew, Mr. Douglas, Mr. Kappeler, Mr. Gill, heads of Shell Oil departments, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Gregg, members of the Bardwell family, members of the press and photographers. Two turkeys, a ham and a cold salmon were served at the buffet dinner.

The Shell Oil Company Service Station on the Barrie Highway located at the King interchange was built to conform with specifications of the Ontario Department of Highways. It was designed by John P. Parkin Associates, architects and engineers, Toronto. The station is situated on nearly four acres with an 825-foot frontage. The building is designed in the Contemporary Canadian Vernacular style carrying out the theme of natural wood and natural stone. Inside the restaurant owned by Messrs. Philip and Harry Bardwell and called Bard 400, the wall facing the gas pumps is of random rubble stone.

Mr. Philip Bardwell managed the Encore Night Club on Restaurant Row in Los Angeles, California for ten years before coming back to Canada to open Bard 400 with his brother Mr. Harry Bardwell. Mr. Harry Bardwell owned two restaurants in Toronto. He sold those and was selling restaurant equipment before coming to Bard 400.

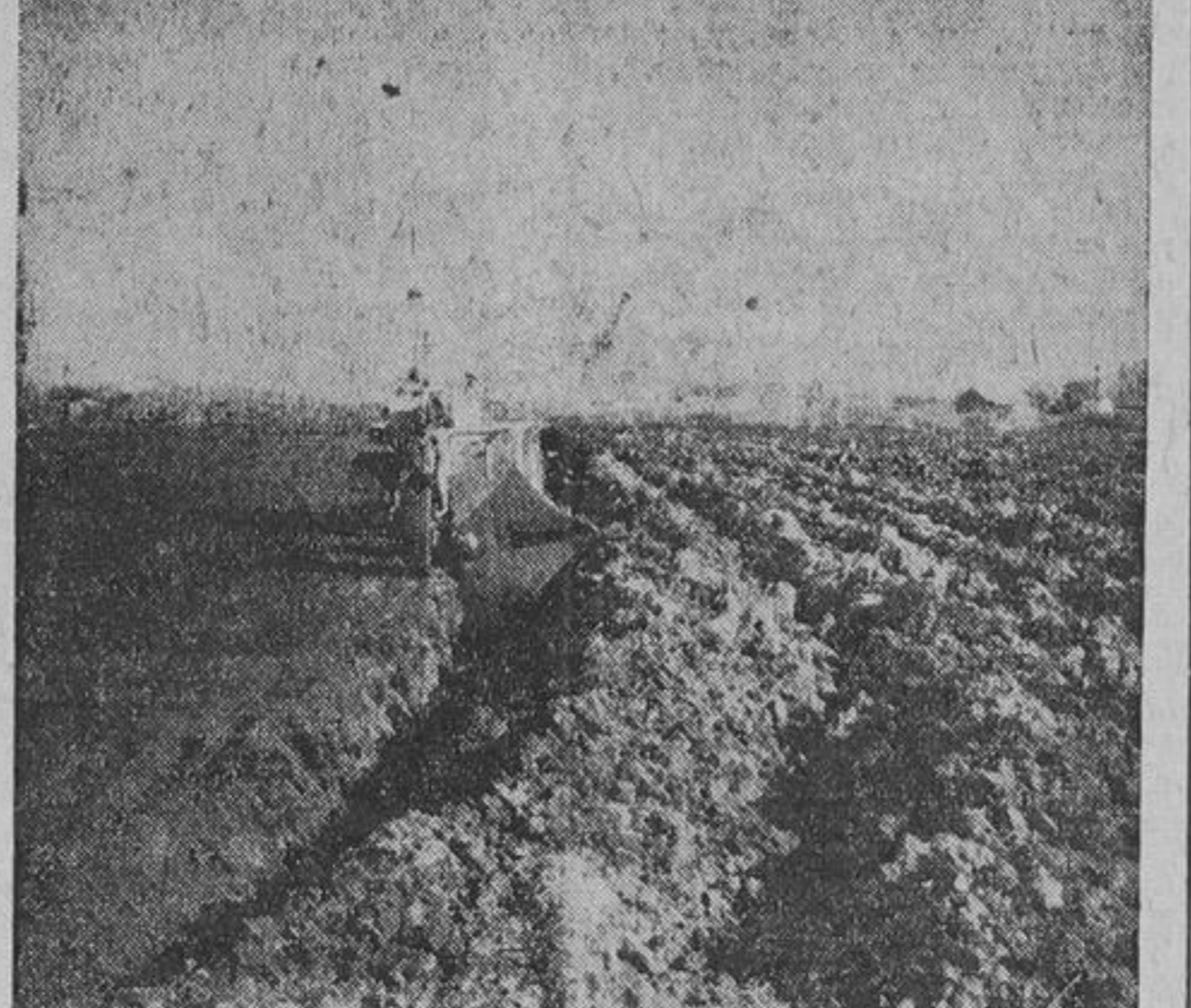
## Eversley Church Holds Anniversary


