1. Keep the arm clean at all

ated Arm

- No dressing or shield should be applied to the arm - If serum is coming from the area, sterile gauze or cotton should be pinned or basted to the inside of the sleeve and changed daily. - Adhesive is not recommended, but if applied should be kept at least two inches from the vaccination. 2. Keep the arm dry at all

- Care should be taken in washing so that the vaccination does not become

- Swimming should not be engaged in until the affected area is completely healed.

3. Consult your Family Physician if the lesion becomes too inflamed or painful.

4. Be sure to bring your child back to school at the same hour seven days after vaccination to have the results recorded and to receive a certificate of vaccin-
