#### STATEMENT

#### To The Ratepayers of Richmond Hill

In connection with the lawsuit of myself against Richmond Hill mentioned in a recent issue of The Liberal. I would like to state the following facts:

I own a valuable piece of property on the east side of Yonge Street, along a branch of the Don, into which the Richmond Hill Sewage Disposal Plant empties. I might say that I have paid the taxes on this property since 1922 and would now like to be able to get some return from it by subdividing it into lots.

In April 1953 I made application to the Township of Markham to subdivide this property, which application was finally refused. I, therefore, asked for a hearing before the Municipal Board, which was granted on the 13th day of April, 1954, and the following is a quotation from the decision of the Board:

"The Board is of the opinion that because of the effect of the creek running through the Plan of the Proposed Subdivision, which creek carries open effluent from the Sewage Disposal Plant of the Village of Richmond Hill, it would be improper for the Board to approve of the Plan at this time."

I might further add that during the years I have owned this property, before the disposal plant operated, I have had tests of the stream taken periodically and the water has always been satisfactory. However, since the Sewage Disposal Plant has been in operation, all tests have shown the water to be polluted.
