## CARS ARE MY LINE

There were 125 makes of steam car turned out in its heyday, but only one name is generally remembered today, the Stanley Steamer. And the Stanley was made right up until 1925.

It was the invention of two brothers, P. E. and F. O. Stanley, who were identical twins. Much of the fame of the Stanley, aside from the fact that it was a good car, came from the sight of the Stanley brothers riding side by side high up on their car with identical moustaches and bowler hats.

In 1907 a Stanley was pounding a Florida beach still gaining speed at 197 miles an hour, when the wind caught its flat under-side and it took off like an airplane. It sailed through the air for 100 feet and landed with a crash. The driver was seriously injured, but he is alive today, an old man still working steam cars.

The invention of the self-starter for gasoline cars was the most crippling blow to steam cars, for the Stanley took as long as an hour to warm up before you could start. A Canadian steamer, the Brooks, was made in Stratford for several years after the Stanley disappeared from the market.
