Should it be snow tires or chains this winter? It may be a question of money, but there are other considerations too.

The great advantage of snow tires is that they are always with you. With chains, you can find yourself stuck after leaving them at home when the snow seemed to be clearing.

Ghains, as any experienced winter driver knows, aren't to be sneezed at. In deep snow, the sides of the chains give a lot of extra traction, and chains can batter their way through the ice to get you going on the most impossible road.
