St. Mary's Anglican Church Completes Successful Year

"Due to the excellent ground work laid in past years, and due to the far-sightedness and sacrificial efforts and givings of the people during the past year, I believe that St. Mary's Church in future years will look back to 1954 as being the turning point in its growth and effective Christian witness in this Community." were the words of the Rev. A. A. Chote to the annual Vestry meeting on Monday evening. He thanked the people from the youngest child in the Sunday School to the eldest parishioner for their help, loyalty and co-operation in making the past year a most successful one.

Rev. Chote pointed out that the work of the Sunday School was of vital importance to the future of the church, stating that "If we teach our children and young people properly in the Christian Faith and bring them into a living relationship with Jesus Christ, then the church need have no fears for future years." In closing his remarks, Rev. Chote said that the spiritual work of the church must always be kept uppermost to give people today new hope, new encouragement, new faith, and new life that is only to be found in Jesus Christ. "That is the first job of the church, no other."

One of the most interesting reports of the Vestry was that presented by R. D. Little, chairman of the Building Committee who are laying the plans for building a new Parish Hall. They were given authorization to continue their work and will be presenting their proposed plans to Vestry for final approval in the near future. A. Legge. Gordon MacLaren reported that the returns from the Church Canvass were coming in well and that the follow-up Committee was most pleased with the results. The financial report presented by Jack Brodrick showed the church receipts total to be \$12,589.20. The amount of monies raised for Missions and Diocesan Church needs totalled \$3,099.14. The Parish showed a balance of \$13,665.32. All other accounts and the church organizations showed substantial balances at the end of their fiscal year.
