Teeth like other parts of the body are formed from the foods we eat, for teeth obtain nourishment from the blood stream through blood vessels both within the tooth and the surrounding tissue. There is a direct relationship between body health and the development of teeth. Thus disease or poor nutrition during the time when teeth are forming lead to poorly formed and defective teeth.

Why should tooth decay become more prevalent as our national nutrition becomes better. The answer lies in the manner in which the tooth is formed and also in the nature of the foods we now eat. Sugars and refined carbohydrates cling closely to the teeth and nourish acid-forming bacteria which in turn dissolve tooth enamel. 
