Kingfield Island Susan was the top 4 year old on 3x for C. F. W. Burns of King City, Ont. She produced 17,243 lbs. milk and 852 lbs. fat in 1954 and placed 4th on the Honor Roll. Mr.

Burns had four class leaders in 1954. He and W. B. Hanna of Kleinburg were also recipients of Canadian Guernsey Class Leaders' Certificates.

Farmer Better Off Than Urban Worker Edgeley Forum Decides

"The Farmer and the Urban Worker" was the subject of the Farm Forum on Monday evening February 21. The Edgeley Forum was held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Darlington.

The questions for discussion were 1. (a) What factor do you think should be considered in deciding which is better off—farmer or urban worker? (b) Taking these factors into consideration, which of the two groups do you feel is better off?

(2) How do you think farmers and urban workers might get to understand each other's viewpoints and problems better.

The Edgeley Forum decided that the factors to be considered were wages, hours of work, social life, security, independence and investment. Taking these factors into consideration, they feel that the farmer is better off. They thought he should not be compared with the urban worker inasmuch as he has capital investment and has to be manager as well as worker.

The forum mentioned that a better understanding between farmer and urban worker might be achieved by arranging a joint

meeting of the Citizens Forum and Farm Forum. They also thought some interest should be created in the Canadian Consumers Association.
