This is just about the biggest night in the year for the children, teaching staff and Home staff and the auditorium will probably be filled by visitors

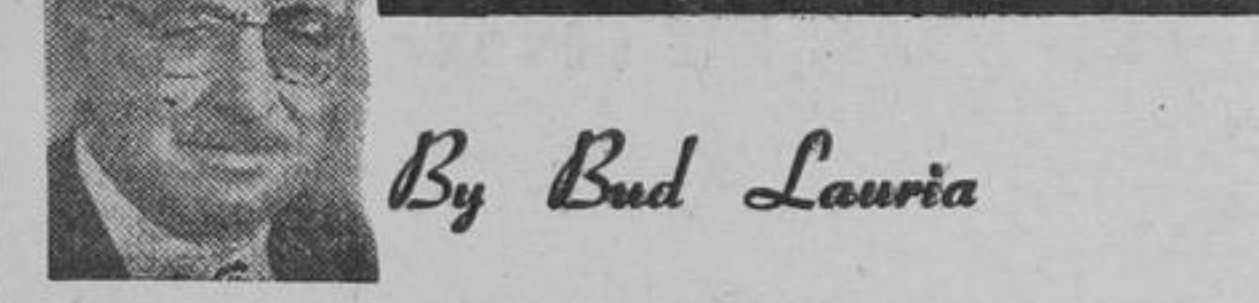

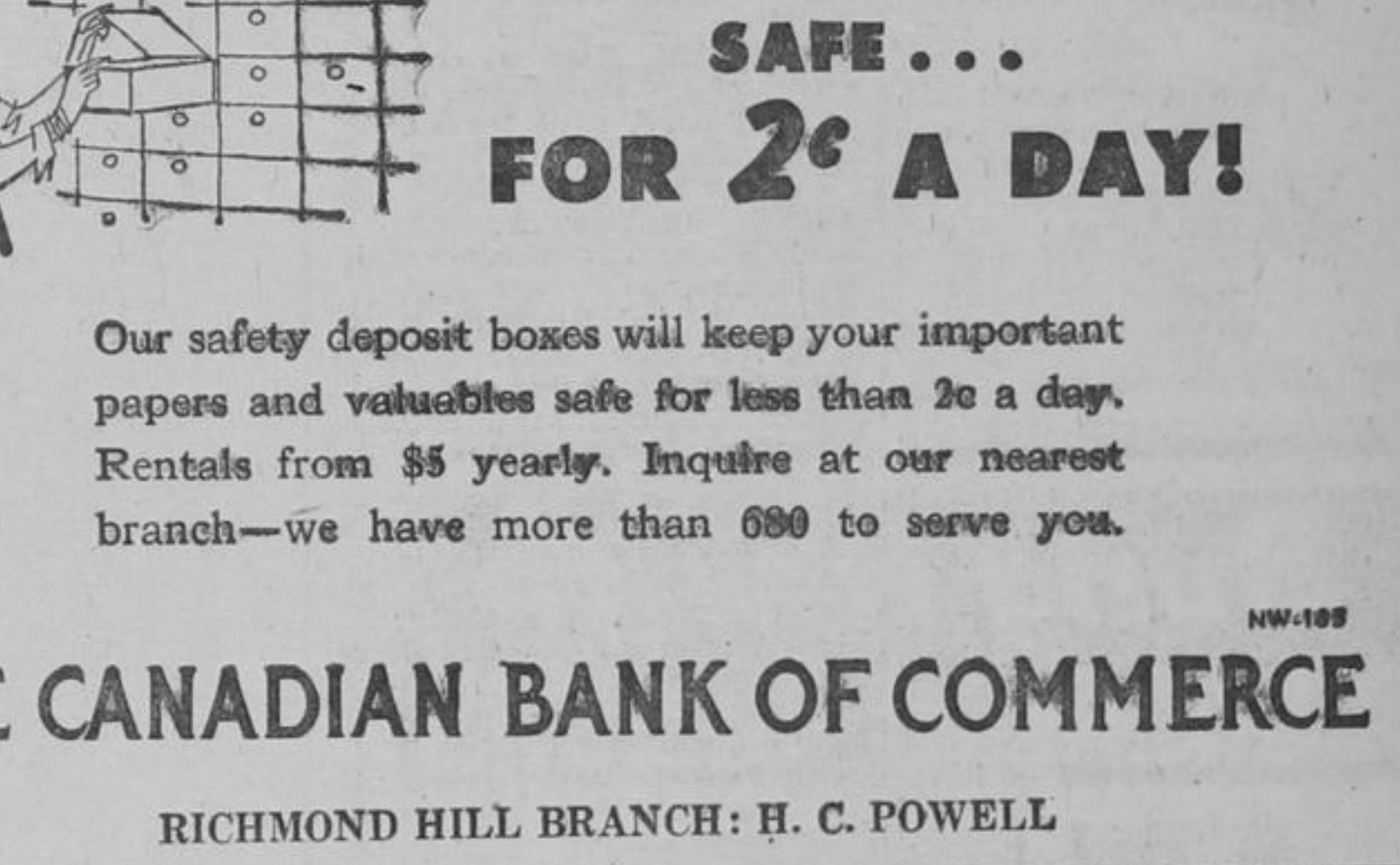
