Magee and \$110 was spent on buying books and last year \$600 was spent. portion as the American parents. There were 72 books in the library in 1920 but by 1921 there were 566 of which only 22 were juvenile. In the library now there are 3,215 volumes of which 1,221 are for children. Also for the year 1920, the library membership stood at 42 all such members being over 21 years of age. Today there are 258 adult members and 355 juvenile members. Adults may take out five books and children four and it is encouraging to see how many youngsters take out their four books, generally once a week, and read them all.
