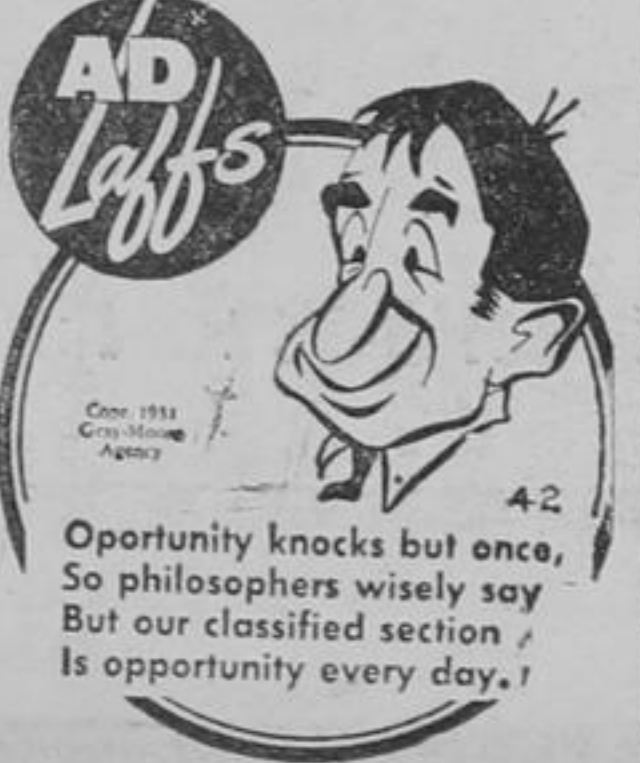

Obituaries

LATE A. B. MACDONALD
The funeral of the late Alexander Boyce Macdonald, a former well-known resident of Richmond Hill, took place Saturday afternoon from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the funeral home. President and founder of the Richmond Industrial Equipment Ltd., he died suddenly in Toronto on Thursday, March 17, at the age of sixty-seven. Although in failing health for about two years he had been about as usual on Thursday and his sudden passing came as a great shock to his family and friends.

A native of Quebec province, the late Mr. Macdonald practiced law in western Canada for some years and came east and lived in Richmond Hill from the early thirties until he moved to Toronto in 1941. Several years ago he founded the firm of Richmond Industrial Equipment Ltd., and successfully carried on the machinery equipment business until his death.

A man of sterling character, the late Mr. Macdonald was highly esteemed by a wide circle of friends and by all with whom he came in contact. A devoted member of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, the funeral service was conducted by Rev. Paul Stirling, Minister of that church.
He is survived by his widow, the former Ann Frank, and two sons Duncan A. (Bill) and Stuart F. (Sam), both chartered accountants practicing in Niagara Falls, Ontario. A daughter Jean preceded him in 1935. He also is survived by five sisters.

Interment took place in Richmond Hill cemetery, the pallbearers being James Mathews, Ronald Yeo, Emmett Colgan, Hugh Yerex, Allan Bales and J. E. Smith, M.P.
