EFFECTS OF NEW SKILL ON OLD ONE Now that spring training is just around the corner and every enthusiastic athlete is trying to get the jump on the other fellow the problems of learning and getting

used to new techniques and skills comes up. The great Knute Rockne, one of the outstanding coaches of all time and coach of a series of highly feared Notre Dame football teams, during one of his equally famous clinics was asked to name what he considered the most important fundamental of success. His answer, which follows, should be well remembered by any athlete. "When a new idea or system is tried the athlete usually feels awkward and loses some of his skill at first and also some of his interest. The wise coach will sell the athlete on the idea that after this temporary period of impaired skill a new peak of efficiency

will be reached." Also remember that the time it takes to acquire this new skill or technique depends on the attention and effort the athlete gives to its practice and the confidence in his coach - realizing that he knows what he's talking about.




