The Council of the Corporation of the Township of Vaughan has constructed a local improvement Watermain on Weston Road from Davidson Dr. to 1595' N. of Gamble Street, on Gamble St. from 565' West of Weston Road to Pinegrove Road and on Pinegrove Rd. from Gamble St. to 200' W. of Bridge over Humber.

2. The cost of the work is \$21,932.19 of which \$4,819.79 is to be paid by the Corporation. The special rate per foot frontage is \$1.79. This special assessment is to be paid in 20 annual instalments.

3. The estimated lifetime of the work is 20 years.

4. An adjourned court of revision will be held on the 28th day of March, 1955, at 2 p.m. o'clock at the Council Chambers in Maple for the purpose of hearing complaints against the proposed assessments or the accuracy of frontage measurements and any other complaint which persons interested may desire to make and which is by law cognisable by the court.
