

GUARD YOUR MAN CLOSELY IN CORNERS When guarding a man who has the basketball in the corner, play a fair distance away from him so you can block any attempt he might make to pivot around you. Keep him hemmed in and force him to shoot from the side.

It is much better to do this than to let him get by you and go right in for the basket. Try to block his shot but make sure he doesn't get past you with the ball. A shot from a poor, side angle is less dangerous.
