GUARD YOUR MAN CLOSELY IN CORNERS

When guarding a man who has the basketball in the corner, play a fair distance away from him so you can block any attempt he might make to pivot around you. Keep him hemmed in and force him to shoot from the side.

It is much better to do this than to let him get by you and go right in for the basket. Try to block his shot but make sure he doesn't get past you with the ball. A shot from a poor, side angle is less dangerous.

Yellow Pickerel Length Limits Revoked; Catch Limits Same

The Department of Lands and Forests announced a few days ago that the limit of length on yellow pickerel taken by angling is revoked, effective 1955. The limits of catch and possession remain the same.

Previously no person could retain, keep out of the water or have in his possession a pickerel

in Lake Erie of less than a total length of 14", or from other Ontario waters, less than a total length of 15".

Regulation No. 36 of the Special Fisheries Regulations for Ontario which remain in effect permit one pickerel being taken per day and a possession limit of six at any time.

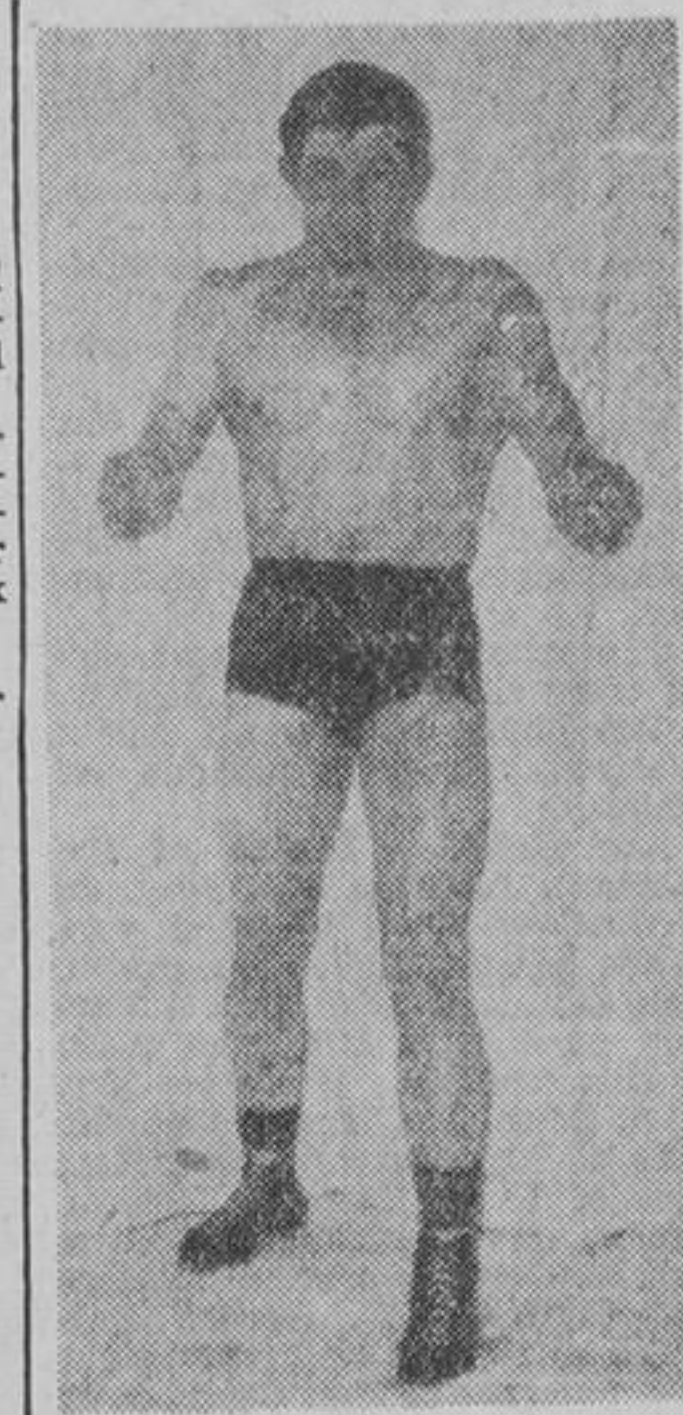
