

More drivers would take loving care of their batteries, we think, if they realized what a safety device the battery can be, as well as the reservoir for the car's electrical system.

When your car has stalled in a tight spot you can move it by turning over the engine with the starter motor and slowly slipping into gear. It is not the best thing for the battery, but it can save your life.

Besides this stand-by emergency role, what a job the battery has to shoulder! The average car today has 20 light bulbs, some models have as many as 38, to say nothing of those power-eaters, the radio, horn and starter.

Looking after your battery is a simple matter of remembering, and it can double your battery's life. Usually, water needs to be added about once a month, but if the battery needs water too often, then charging is too high. If it's only one cell that constantly needs extra water, a leak is the problem.


