May Be Drop In Markham Mill Rate

Markham's township Council's Finance Committee (Councillors A. Little and D. Deacon) indicated Monday that the taxpayers of the township may receive a slight decrease in the 1955 mill rate. A reduction of approximately one mill is expected to result from this years budget. Although there will likely be a drop in the mill rate there has been a corresponding rise in the overall township assessment of from two to three million dollars.

There will be a rise in the cost of police and fire protection and a slight drop in the cost of road and general government.

Suggested figure for these items include general government, \$48,075; Police protection, \$36,500; Fire protection, \$7,500 and Markham's share of the roads costs \$87,500.
