You're driving merrily along at a good highway clip on one of the first warm days in spring. You have to slow down at a traffic jam. Suddenly the car stalls and won't restart.

It's obviously the fuel pump, you say, and sometimes it is. But one of the possible causes people seldom think about is "vapor lock".

It's a mysterious thing, and since it's a condition you can't see, vapor lock is a dilemma that's not too well understood.

But if you remember about it, you may save yourself the expense of a new fuel pump.

Vapor lock usually happens on the season's first warm days when some service stations haven't received their supply of summer-time gas. The difference is important, for in the winter gasoline is made to vaporize easily for ready starts. In the summertime, that advantage becomes a disadvantage.

When you slowed down in that traffic jam, the engine heated up a bit and the gasoline in the carburetor, fuel line and pump began to vaporize. But the pump is made to force through liquid gas, not vapor. The engine stops. It looks like a case for a new fuel pump.

If it is vapor lock, it can be cured easily by pouring cold water over the fuel pump and fuel lines to condense the gas.

That's a simple answer to a complicated problem. Only experience can give you the answers, and it's experience that gives a good mechanic the ability to tell when you need repairs - and when you DON'T need repairs. That's just one of the reasons so many owners leave their cars in the careful hands of our service department.
