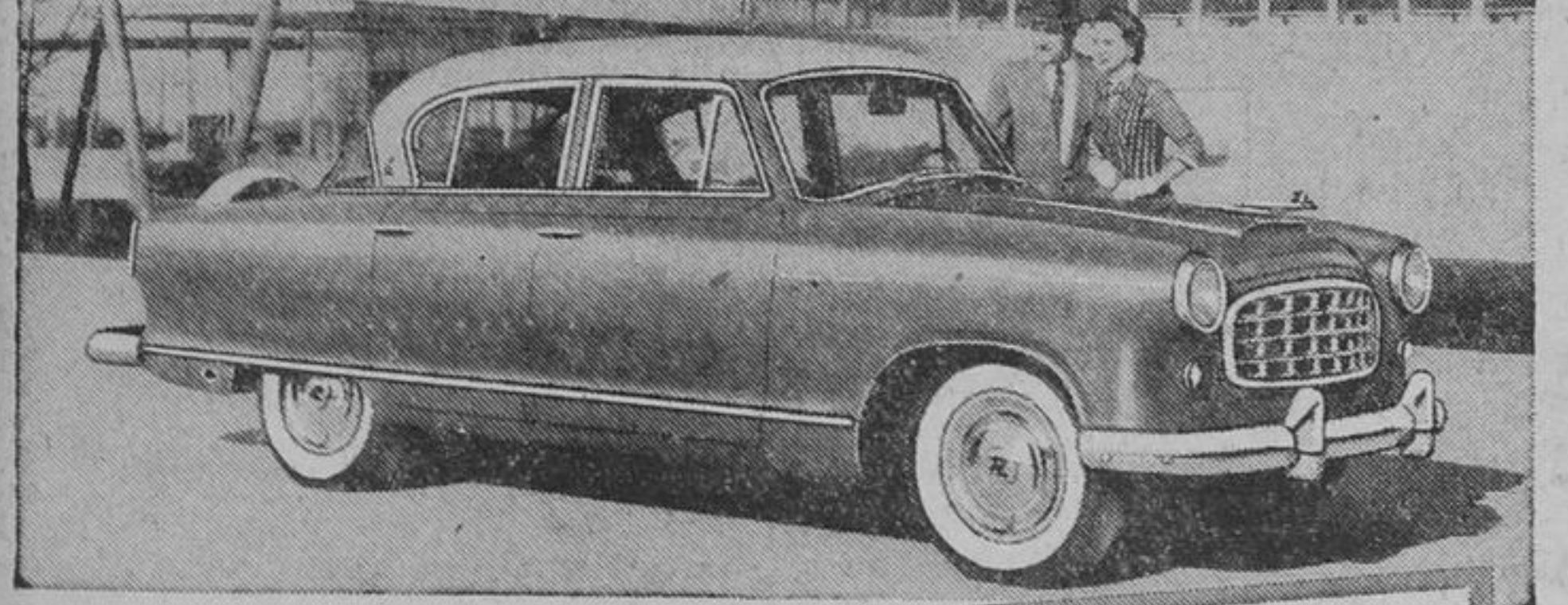
Oak Ridges Bowling Club Presentations
