A flower bed has been prepared for the girls and boys of Grade 8, who will plant the floral emblem of each province in Canada. They will attend to the McNichold.

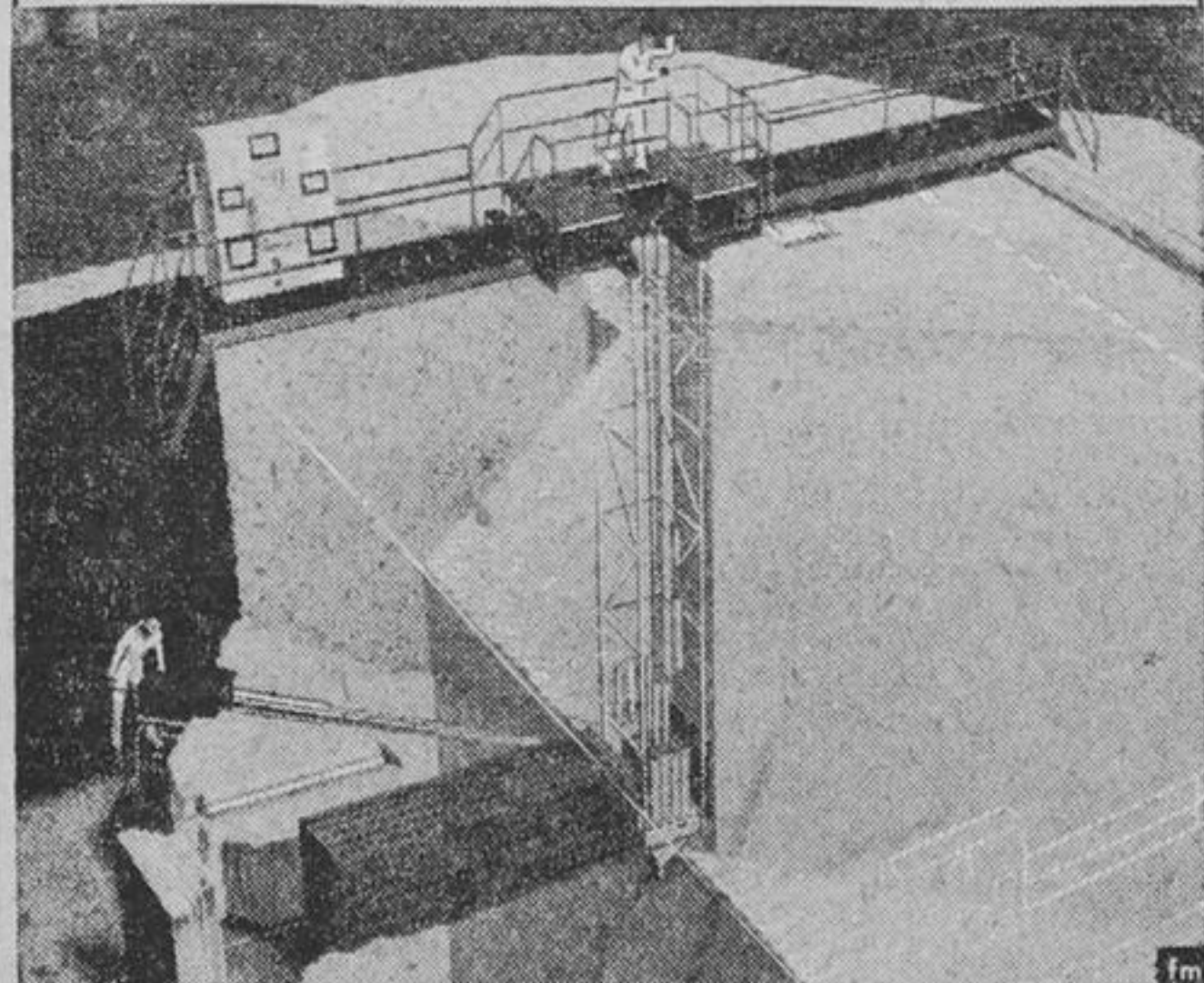
and hope the bed will continue to flourish as a remembrance of their last year in public school.

Atomic Power For Better Living



An artist's drawing of the first nuclear reactor to be put to work by private industry for improving a wide range of consumer products.

The first nuclear reactor to be owned and operated by private industry to produce atomic energy for peaceful, civilian purposes, has been designed and is planned for construction.

The American Machine & Foundry Company will build the reactor at an estimated cost of \$1,500,000. It will be used to develop different and better foods, medicines, textiles, plastics and other consumer goods.

General Walter Bedell Smith, vice chairman of the board of the company, predicted that the harnessing of atomic energy to the needs of American industry will greatly aid in research and in the production of countless necessities to daily living.

The new plant, to be located on a 250-acre site in New York State, is planned as the first of a number of atomic reactors for industry throughout the country. Representative companies from each industry will use the reactor jointly.
