meaning life. This means that this type of animal spends part of its life in water and part on land. Amphibians are coldblooded, air-breathing vertebrates (animals with a backbone). Cold-blooded, as in contrast to warm-blooded means that they cannot maintain a constant body temperature. Birds and mammals are warmblooded. There are five basic differences between "Amphibians" and "Reptiles" namely:-Amphibians

1. Skin is devoid of scales and is moist or slimy.

2. Eggs are enclosed in soft, membranous skin.

4. Young undergo a gilled larval stage between egg and ad-

2. Eggs are enclosed in more or less calcified shells.
