Last week, Vaughan Township Council awarded tenders totalling \$120,127.92 to the Stephens Bros. Construction Co. at Richvale. The tenders were submitted for grading and surfacing portions of Batherst St. Keele St., Jane St., and Main St. in the township.

Four companies tendered for the contract and there was a general range of \$4000 to \$6000 difference between the highest and lowest tenders on each portion of the work. 
