

News From Next Door

N. GWILLIMBURY: Township police have apprehended two Toronto youths in connection with a wave of outboard motor thefts in the Lake Simcoe and Lake Rosseau areas.

SUTTON: Police are still searching for a group of men involved in a cattle rustling raid in the area, in which 18 cattle were stolen from the farm of William Sellers. All the cattle have been located now through the efforts of the Sutton force aided by the OPP. However, two cows had been slaughtered before they were traced.

LAKE SIMCOE: Fishermen report that during the recent warm weather the catch has been rather low, however it is expected that the cooler fall weather will increase the catch.

NORTH YORK: Beth Pitshak, the first synagogue in the municipality was dedicated last week. Members of the congregation donated the funds for the land and the centre which will cost about \$100,000 when completed.

ORANGEVILLE: When a driver jumped from the cab of his burning truck near here recently, he was severely injured when the wheels of the truck trailer passed over him.

NORTH YORK: The Attorney General's Department plans to investigate into the resignation of two township police officers and the demolition of another.

MARKHAM: Rev. and Mrs. D. R. McKillop left last week for Scotland where Rev. McKillop will take a year's study at the University of Edinburgh. Rev. Mr. Killican is minister of St. Andrew's, Markham and St. James Stouffville Presbyterian Churches and during his absence Rev. Harry H. Green, B.A., will take charge of the joint congregations. Rev. Mr. Green comes to his new charge from White Rock B.C.

BOLTON: As yet, no one has been hired for the position of town police constable.

AGINCOURT: With the installation of three portables at the high school here, the staff now numbers 17.

ALMIRA: Work has started on an extension to the Mennonite church here.

ONTARIO CITY: The Department of Agriculture reports that the grain crop is low in the County this year.

SUTTON: Seventy-one per cent of village ratepayers voted recently to install municipal water and sewerage at a cost of \$480,000 over a 20 year period.

STOUFFVILLE: Mr. A. C. Byers, a motorman with the TTC for the past 30 years has now retired.

MARKHAM: Thieves last week escaped with \$300 from the safe of the Simpson Sears office here. The safe was later found in the Presbyterian churchyard.

NORTH YORK: Sanitary sewers for four new schools in the township will cost \$177,000.

PICKERING: A large outdoor swimming pool has been suggested for the area.

NORTH YORK: A 17-year-old youth escaped possible death last week when he leapt up onto the hood of an auto which was bearing down on him.

BRADFORD: Work has been started on the new Anglican rectory here.

AURORA: Further step in connection with the annexation of land to the south and west of Aurora, now part of King Township, is underway. Surveyors have been working recently, establishing boundaries of the area which is approximately 450 acres.

STOUFFVILLE: An unusual incident occurred during the Marmora - Sunderland O.B.A. game last week when a foul tip from a bat accidentally landed on the windshield of a brand new car parked behind the screen. The windshield was smashed into a million pieces, estimated cost of damage amounting to \$100.

BROOKLIN: Two triple-yoked pullet's eggs were discovered among the yield from the flock of Levi Arksey. Each egg, although a trifle larger in size, was quite normal on the outside and contained three perfect yolks.

AURORA: Wife of the Deputy-Reeve, Mrs. Victor Jones, with her recent win of a Sealy Posturepedic mattress in a limerick contest held through Thompson's Furniture Store now becomes eligible for the grand prize offered by Sealy Inc. of \$20,000 cash or \$100,000 worth of life insurance.

Road Budget Down To \$12,000 Balance

Road superintendent E. Davis estimated at a recent meeting of Whitechurch Township Council that only about \$12,000 remains available for expenditure on roads for the balance of the year.

A supplementary by-law is believed necessary to make enough additional money available for the year. Good progress is being made on the roads in the township, he reported, although the severe weather of the last winter has made good roads this season almost an impossibility. He expressed the opinion, however, that Whitechurch roads were at least as good as those in surrounding municipalities, if not better.

Vaughan Roads - Bridges Program Within Estimate

A survey of expenses for the roads and bridges programme in Vaughan Township was presented to Council at the September meeting last Monday afternoon by Duncan Hopper Associates, consulting engineers for the township. The report based on the contracts awarded revealed that the contracts awarded will be well within the amount set aside for the project by by-law.

The nine stretches of road in the township which will receive special attention will cost an estimated \$217,900, while the amount approved by the Department of Highways totalled \$221,566. Eight bridge projects are estimated to cost \$200,028 while the by-law amount was set at \$201,900. The road work will receive a 50% subsidy while the bridges are eligible for 80% subsidy.

Award Tenders Subject to approval of the Department of Highways and the engineers, Council accepted a tender from H. Millard Construction for \$38,369 for work on Dufferin Street, including curbs, asphalt, and prime pole moving, etc. There were four tenders ranging from the accepted low tender to a high of \$52,527.

Make Test Carrville Well

An official test on the Carrville Rd. well was made on Wednesday by International Water Supply on behalf of Vaughan Township to determine the potential of the well as a source of supply for the Vaughan Township Water Area No. 1. Unofficially, the well has been pumping in the neighbourhood of 800 gallons per minute during the past week and it is felt that it is capable of producing a million gallons per day.

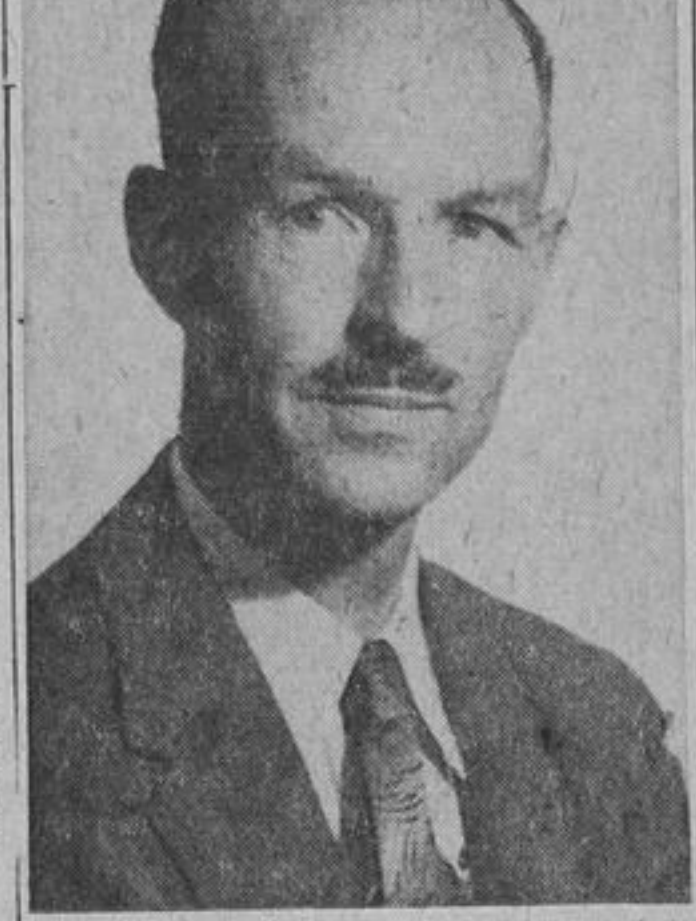
If the well meets with expectations, it will be adequate to meet the demands of the water area for the present time. However, Council has stated that the increased water supply will not open the door for widespread development in the front end of the township at the present.

Crack Down On Substandard Housing In Duncan Road Area

Mr. Boyle contended that he had already cut all the noxious weeds on his property and that all that remained was grass. He also objected to the attitude of the inspector.

Survey Reveals 19 Homes Breech Building By-Laws

In a crack-down on substandard housing in the Duncan Road area of Richvale, Markham township council Monday instructed its Building Department to inform by registered letter the owners of 19 homes not measuring up to the township's building standards that they must comply with the building by-laws within 30 days or face prosecution.

A careful house to house check of the area by Planning Director R. Forrest and Building Inspector W. Craig merely confirmed an earlier charge made by a resident of the district that substandard homes were being erected contrary to township by-laws. In addition to the 19 homes there is also one case of a small dwelling being erected without a building permit.

During the morning the 35 members from six clubs were busy at judging the classes of carrots and onions and answering a quiz on various aspects of garden culture and vegetable use. W. M. Cockburn, Agricultural Representative for York County spoke briefly to the group, giving advice and encouragement to gardeners and expressing appreciation of the work done by club leaders and Women's Institutes in assisting the Homemaking Club program.

Vaughan Hires Waterworks Supt.

Vaughan Township Council has approved the hiring of William J. Norris as Waterworks Superintendent for the new township water area in the southern portion of the first concession. The new superintendent will receive \$3200 annually plus mileage. The successful applicant is a resident of Richvale. Five applications for the position were received.

Issue 24 Building Permits In August

During the past month Markham township Building Inspector W. Craig reports that his department issued 24 building permits to cover a total estimated \$207,930 in construction. Total permit fees collected amounted to \$263.00. Fees collected for 22 septic tank permits amounted to \$132.00.
