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
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One of the signs of real intelligence is the ability to learn from the experience of others, not to be pig-headed about our own ideas and to accept the good and reject the bad from other people and other places.

Some of the ways of European driving we could very well adopt over here.

I've always been intrigued with one idea they have in Switzerland. At every blind intersection there are huge mirrors set at a 45 degree angle so that a driver has a clear view of what's coming from the side.

In London, cars don't use their headlights at night, just parking lights. You really don't need anything more on a well-lighted street and headlights just add to the glare.

All the road signs in Europe are standardized; you don't even have to know the language of the country you're in to understand them.

There are "signs" you have to know in the car business, too. When a car comes in for trade you have to think "Could a car with pedal treads worn that much really have only 25,000 miles on it?"

Or, on the other hand, you have to cock your head in suspicion when the speedometer says 25,000 and there are BRAND NEW rubber treads on the pedals. For, if a car dealer makes a mistake in taking in a trade-in car there's one person he's going to try to pass the mistake on to - the customer.

When you're in the car business you have to know how to sell cars, granted. Just as important, you have to know how to BUY cars. You can then give a fair price to the person who's trading in and keep his business. And you'll be able to sell the car again, also at a fair price. That, I think, is why we've been staked out at the same place, in the same business, for so long.




