Trustees Hire Planning Consultant

At a special two hour meeting of the Thornhill village trustees on Tuesday night, A. Ecclestone, village solicitor; presented a candidate for the post of town planning consultant and after considerable discussion, the decision was made to hire him.

Mr. D. J. W. Little of Toronto is the new planning consultant and he presented his qualifications to the trustees as well as his plans and ideas for the program he should follow to obtain information on incorporation. All the trustees were considerably impressed by Mr. Little's qualifications and immediate steps were made to acquaint him with the project and start him to work.

Mr. Little will start work on Monday with an office of his own in the Thornhill Library. He will attend all meetings of any sort in the area to learn the problems and ideas of the ratepayers and provide them with any and all information as it becomes available. The trustees instructed their secretary to write letters to the Reeves of both Markham and Vaughan townships to let them know they had hired Mr. Little and to give him their cooperation and help in obtaining the information he desires.
