Giant Lemons

An item of interest was reported to this office recent-ly. It consists of a two pound, two ounce lemon, specially grown in a green-house in Richmond Hill. The lemon was grown by Mr. Jack Robertson, a retired Scotsman, who worked at the greenhouse for many years. Some time ago, he sent away to California for a slip from one of their lemon trees. When it arrived, he nursed it and tended it until it grew to its present height of six feet.

The tree is kept at a height of six feet and its limbs are tied up prior to its producing time. The tree starts producing lemons in May and continues to pro-duce them right through to November. It produces some 150 normal size lemons and about a dozen lemons of the giant variety. These range in size all the way up to two and a half pounds in weight.
