## Fractures Leg

Jane Simpson, 13 year-old-daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Simpson, Thornhill, received a broken leg on December 26th as the result of a tobogganing accident on a hill west of the Wilfred Ball property. With her at the time was Nora Wood, 12year-old daughter, of Rev. and Mrs. Shirley Wood.

The toboggan hit a hole near the bottom of the hill, throwing the two girls and breaking Miss Simpson's leg. Help was called and the injured girl was transported to the home of Mr. A. E. Huggins nearby. Dr. Allan Smith of Richmond Hill was called and after relieving the girl of pain, had her transported to Sick Children's Hospital in Toronto.

Although the fracture is not a great one, it will require a pin to hold the broken bones in place and Miss Simpson is expected to remain in a cast for 10 weeks. She is expected to be released from hospital on Friday or Saturday.




