Eight lessons are required to complete the course. At the completion, club members attend and take part in the Achievement Day program. Leaders and members select the program for the coming year at the Achievement Day.

Forum Favours Health Plan Controlled By People Served

Edgeley Farm Forum topic for February 27 was "Paying for Our Health." Discussions were based on the advantages and disadvantages of the Swift Current Health Plan, which is a public pre-paid medical-dental care program and the comparison of it with the Ontario medical co-operatives which are controlled by the people they serve.

Members also discussed their opinions of a reasonable annual payment for hospital, surgical, medical and complete coverage, including dental care. Edgeley Forum cited two important advantages of Ontario medical co-operatives and favored a plan controlled by the people it serves. The Ontario medical co-operatives also have a Catastrophic Plan which is widely accepted by the members and pays 60 per cent of major expenses when families lose their life savings and get helplessly into debt because their medical expenses run into four figures.

Members thought \$60 a reasonable annual payment instead of the present \$80 and that more people would buy prepaid health plans if the rates were reduced \$20 per year.

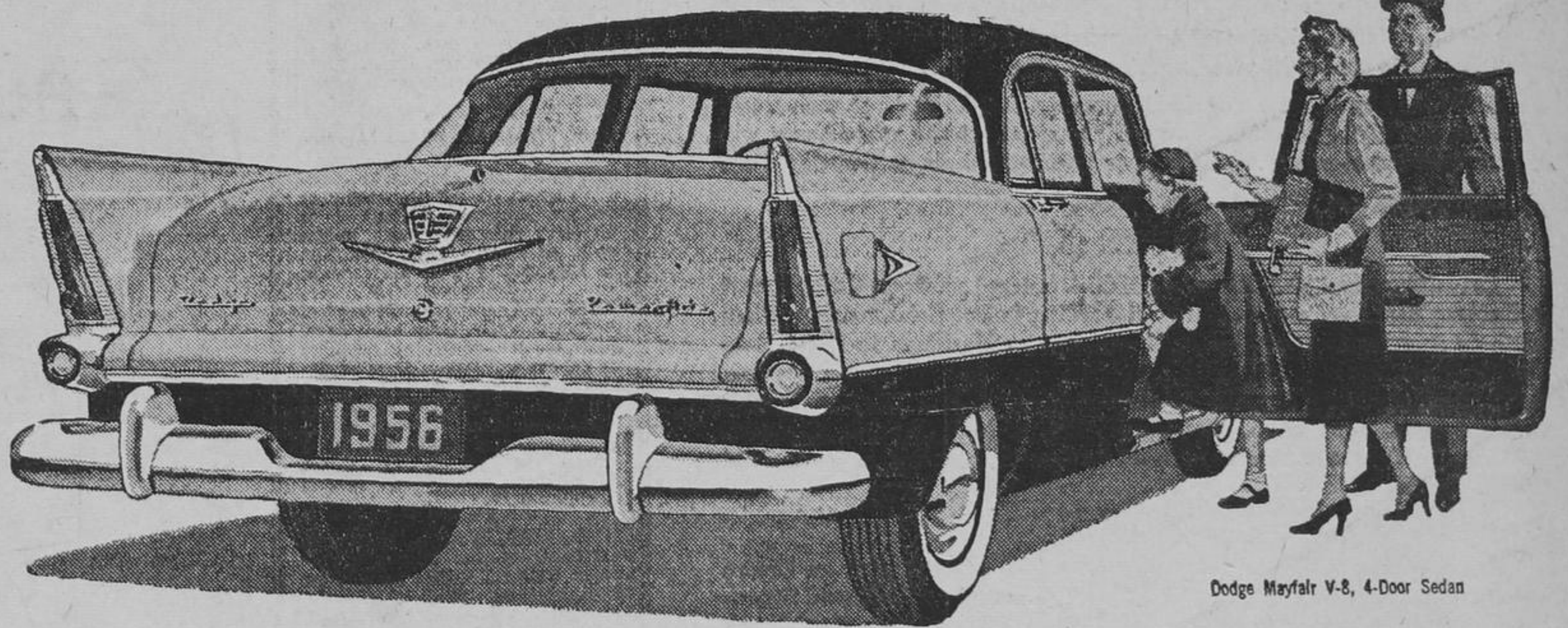
