J. A. Bailey Meets Executive Of Beverley Acres Ratepayers

At a meeting held Friday of last week, Mr. J. A. Bailey, well known Richmond Hill subdivider, was the guest of the Beverley Acres Ratepayers' executive.

Mr. Bailey addressed the group on the problems that arise in any new development, and methods of handling these emergencies.

He was then asked about the streets in the development and what could be done to improve them.

Mr. Bailey stated that with all the present traffic, it was almost impossible to keep the roads in top condition. "However," he stated, "six inches of gravel and calcium chloride will be put on before freeze-up."

Paving should be started in the spring and completed by July.

President F. Murphy then questioned Mr. Bailey on the responsibility for snow removal.

Mr. Bailey replied that as the roads have been deemed to be the town, snow removal is the responsibility of the municipality.
