Facts About Milk Should milk and acid fruits be taken at the same meal?

The belief that fruit causes milk to curdle in the stomach is the objection often raised to taking acid fruits and milk at the same time. As a matter of fact, the first process of digestion is curdling, and the gastric juice in the stomach is largely responsible for this change.

The curd which results from a mixture of fruit acids and milk is much finer and therefore easier to digest than the milk curd formed with acid found normally in the stomach. The milk and fruit combination is therefore to be desired rather than

Present-day methods of infant feeding disprove the fruit-milk fallacy. Doctors report as many as four acids used in this country for the artificial acidification of cow's milk for infant feeding.
