Storm Sewers For New Subdivision

Richmond Hill's newest subdivision, the re-zoned area of Beverley acres, will have 26 ft. pavements, curbs and storm sewers. J. A. Bailey, through his engineer Grant Duff made this offer to the Village at Monday night's council meeting and it was given council approval, subject to an O.K. from village engineers. The wider pavement, curbs and storm sewers will be provided by Mr. Bailey at no extra cost to the municipality.

Reeve Taylor and members of council expressed satisfaction with the Bailey proposal. Firstly they said it will make a more attractive subdivision, secondly it will eliminate the ditches and drainage complaints which have come in the past from other subdivisions, and thirdly the plan will help alleviate conditions which are now the subject of some complaint in the already developed areas.

At a recent meeting of council complaints were heard about the open drainage ditches in the new subdivisions.
