POLLING SUBDIVISION IB — consisting of that part of Ward 1 lying south of the centre line of Richmond Street including Pleasantville Plan 4635 to village limits — Lillian M. McConaghy Public School.

POLLING SUBDIVISION 2A — consisting of that part of Ward 2 lying north of the centre line of Crosby Avenue to the village limits and east of Canadian National Railway right-of-way. Residence of Mr. and Mrs. T. Robertson, 355 Taylor Mills Drive north.

POLLING SUBDIVISION 2B — consisting of that part of Ward 2 lying north of the centre line of Centre Street east to the centre line of Crosby Avenue and east of the Canadian National Railway right-of-way. — Walter Scott Public School.

POLLING SUBDIVISION 2C — consisting of that part of Ward 2 lying north of the centre line of Centre Street east to the village limits and west of the Canadian National Railways right-of-way. — Masonic Hall.

POLLING SUBDIVISION 3A — consisting of that part of Ward 3 lying south of the centre line of Centre Street east to the village limits and east of the Canadian National right-of-way. — Walter Scott Public School.

POLLING SUBDIVISION 3B — consisting of that part of Ward 3 lying south of the centre line of Centre Street east to the centre line of Markham Road, west of the Canadian National Railway right-of-way. — Masonic Hall.

POLLING SUBDIVISION 3C — consisting of that part of Ward 3 lying south of the centre line of Markham Road to the village limits, west of the Canadian National Railway right-of-way. — Masonic Hall.
