

NOTICE TO CATTLE OWNERS

As York County is a Supervised Area for Brucellosis, cattle owners are reminded of the following regulations under the Brucellosis Act, 1956.

- (a) Every heifer calf must be vaccinated after it attains the age of four months but before it reaches the age of nine months.
- (b) Every cattle owner must arrange with his Veterinarian for the vaccination of his heifer calves.
- (c) If the Veterinarian has an agreement with the Minister - and most Veterinarians in supervised areas have such agreement - the cost of the vaccinations will be paid by the Ontario Department of Agriculture.
- (d) No female cattle over 36 months of age may be taken into a supervised area from a non-supervised area unless accompanied by a permit. For particulars with regard to the regulations governing imports, contact your Veterinarian.


